# STEM History

During the 28-year history of the STEM program, thousands of office and support staff members have been trained throughout the state – from Houston to Dallas, Beaumont to El Paso, Harlingen to Lubbock, and all areas in between. Many of these participants have become STEM consultants and continued the long-standing tradition of professionalism, excellence, and information-sharing.

To help our current TESA members have a better understanding of the history of the STEM program, I have gathered information from several sources including the "Educational Secretaries and Support Staff Training Program, An Executive Summary of the 1986 Pilot Training Program in Texas" (quoted material is from this source) and various STEM brochures and TESA magazines. While this may be a bit lengthy to read, it will definitely explain how and why the STEM program was born. You will note that STEM did not just happen overnight but took several years to be fully functional. Success was a direct result of the participation and collaboration of many, many people. So grab a cup of coffee, your reading glasses and get ready to learn a bit of history about our own 28-year old STEM program.

With the emphasis in Texas on the building principal as the instructional leader which grew out of the Educational Reform Act of 1984 (House Bill 72, 68th Texas Legislature, Second Called Session), the Texas Education Agency (TEA) conducted interviews by phone and in person to gather suggestions that would help administrators face the new challenges of productivity and efficiency. Most of the principals responded that their secretaries and other office employees would confront enough change, adjustments, and new challenges to justify a training program for them.

The results of this TEA survey were given to the Texas Educational Secretaries Association (TESA) who agreed that there was a need for this kind of training. The TESA officers were interested in the program. They suggested that the most effective type of training would have to be delivered in more than one session with follow-up material to keep trainees in an extended mode of training instead of a one-shot "revival" format in which a large volume of material is covered and soon forgotten. Their recommendation was that a phase-in program should be delivered over a three year period.

An advisory committee built the framework of the Educational Secretaries and Support Staff Training Program (ESSSTP). The advisory committee members represented the following:

- Texas Educational Secretaries Association (TESA)
- Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association (TEPSA)
- Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA)

- Regional Education Service Center Executive Directors Advisory Council (RESCEDAC)
- Colleges and Universities
- Texas Association of Community Schools (TACS)
- Texas Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (TASCD)

After the advisory committee defined the direction of the program, TEA staff conducted research for the content of the training sessions. This research included an ERIC search, a review of professional literature, and the curriculum of a national professional secretarial training program. A survey was conducted of those Texas school districts which had already been giving some standardized secretarial training. Dr. William Rutherford, Association Professor, College of Education, The University of Texas at Austin, was asked to glean information from his effective administrator research concerning what a 'good secretary' does to make a campus or district more efficient.

Once this information was collected, the advisory committee proposed a three-part curriculum for Phase I, which consisted of Texas School Reform, Effective Office Practices, and Communication Skills. An ad hoc committee developed the curriculum for these three content areas. All content and format recommendations were subject to the advisory committee's review and approval. Out of all these efforts emerged the Phase I Pilot of the ESSSTP. The Phase I Pilot consisted of an 18-hour program:

- Day 1 (6 hours) Overview of Texas School Reform
- Day 2 (6 hours) Effective Office Prac-

tices

 Day 3 (6 hours) – Educational Office Personnel Communication Training

TEA staff collaborated with officers of TESA in the selection of the pilot sites. They considered demographics, school district size, and the availability of pilot participants. School districts were contacted and asked for their participation on a voluntary basis. Fifteen Texas school districts asked to be considered as pilot sites and, because of funding limitations, only five districts could be accommodated. The following five school districts were chosen: Carrollton-Farmers Branch ISD, Corpus Christi ISD, Cypress-Fairbanks ISD, El Paso ISD, and Longview ISD. The TESA Executive Board agreed to participate in the pilot program at their 1986 summer conference.

All pilot participants took pretests and posttests. Training was delivered in three training modules so there were sets of tests administered in each one. Pretests were given prior to the delivery of any content material and posttests were given at the conclusion of each module. The testing was done for the purposes of diagnosing entry level skills, prescribing refinement of the training program beyond the pilot stage, and assessing the need for remediation. The tests were scored on site, feedback was given immediately to participants and results were discussed in group sessions.

Certificates of completion were awarded to the participants. The rationale for testing and certifying the participants was for the sake of uniformity and consistency with the Texasmandated instructional leadership program for administrators and the advanced academic training program for teachers.

A total of 103 trainees participated in the five pilot training sessions held at the school

districts. There were school secretaries, school district central office secretaries, and other support staff members who participated. At each site, six or seven local school district administrators attended portions of the training as well.

When the training in the five school districts was finished, the entire program was formally evaluated. There were also written, anonymous evaluations from the participants at the end of each training day. The site-based process research or follow-up study gave the evaluators the opportunity to gather information from conversations with participants and from on-site observation of techniques and skills being applied 'back home' in the work place two to three weeks after the training. Approximately one-half of the participants were visited. A written survey measured the usefulness of the training material; comments and observations made during the visits and group feedback sessions were recorded. As viewed by those who attended the three-part workshop, this was a highly successful training program.

Although the emphasis in the ESSSTP is on the development of a good working relationship between support staff and administrators, the precepts of the training are equally applicable to the working relationships among teachers, support staff, and administrators. The advisory committee discussed the outcomes of the pilot program and made the following recommendations: (not all are listed here)

- Educational Secretaries and Support Staff Training should be made available to as many secretaries and support staff members as possible
- It is important to the success of this training that it is delivered by effective presenters and that great care is taken to maintain the quality of it
- Participants should make their leaders

- aware of the content of the training program in cases where the leader is unable to participate
- Secretaries and support staff members who have participated in the ESSSTP should encourage their peers to attend future workshops

Phase I of the STEM program was funded through an ECIA, Chapter 2, Section 577 grant during the 1986-1987 school year. After Phase I was successfully implemented, TESA took over the administration of Phase I and further developed and implemented Phases II and III. For many years, STEM was a three-phase program designed to enhance technical and job-specific skills for educational support personnel and participants were required to take sessions in a certain order. In 1998, the STEM program was remodeled to allow participants to take classes in any order. Now, participants progress through the program requirements of attending 60 hours of training (42 hours of required and choice STEM classes combined with 18 hours of self-directed study) to achieve the Certified Educational Office Professional (CEOP) certification. An annual six-hour certification update is also included for those who wish to keep their certification current.

A highlight for the STEM program occurred during the 2001-2002 year. The first STEM graduation ceremony was held at the TESA Summer Work Conference in June 2002. A total of 91 participants completed their CEOP certification that year and 15 participants were recognized during the graduation ceremony. STEM graduates have been recognized in a number of ways throughout the years but none so important as the ability to put CEOP behind their names.

Many other changes and upgrades have been made to STEM throughout the years to improve the program. To the delight of



many, the removal of pretests and posttests from the STEM classes was exciting! Classes are continually added, deleted, and updated as needed. Monetary stipends for STEM certification completion were offered by a number of school districts in the past but few provide this incentive now. STEM Consultant Training has evolved and changed during the years just as much as the STEM program. In the early years, Consultant Training was held at least two times per year in different parts of the state with many consultants and prospective consultants in attendance for two full days of training. Consultant Training has taken on many forms - one day, two days, full weekends, once per year, twice per year, every other year, mini training weekends - and attendance has grown and shrunk as the needs of the program have done the same. Numbers of participants in the STEM program has also blossomed and faded throughout the years with a variety of factors contributing to the fluctuation including economy, school district support, interest, and family and job obligations. For many years, much of the STEM training was held at regional educational service centers throughout Texas with the training rooms busting at the seams. After a while, though, we apparently saturated the market and trained everyone possible. Training is now primarily hosted by local school districts and affiliates in various parts of the state.

In 1989, I was asked by TESA President Sandra Walker to serve on the very first STEM Committee (1989-1990) with Willetta House and Chairman Pat Suber. Of course I said "yes" but I had no idea what I was getting into or what STEM was for that matter. Together, we learned all about STEM, paved a direction for the program to grow, and became life-long learners in a program we all truly believed in and came to love. We have really come a long way from those early days of making many trips to the TESA Central Office in Austin to record STEM participants' informa-

tion on index cards by hand and doing very little by computer. Record-keeping is now computerized in the TESA Central Office. I continued as a member of the STEM committee for a second year in 1990-1991 and was then handed the reins as chairman for the next two years (1991-1993). I must have been crazy for doing that, right? Actually, I was given a wonderful opportunity to impact thousands of people for years to come through an amazing program. I have fond memories of those two years. I would shut my office door at lunch, pull out my STEM box, and during one quick hour, approve, disapprove, and record STEM information for hundreds of STEM participants. I learned the ins and outs of traveling across the state to promote STEM and meet with prospective hosts. I even began my love of being a STEM consultant during those early years while under the guidance of my dear friend, Willetta House. I learned a great deal about people and leadership and responsibility and decision making. I learned how to not lay awake at night wondering if the STEM materials arrived at the site and if the consultant remembered to go to the session that day. I learned that STEM never ends while working on STEM during lunch hours, after work, on weekends, on planes, in cars and vans, during holidays and school breaks, on vacation, while awake, while asleep.

In doing research for this, I ran across a Reflections article I had written on index cards for the Texas Secretary at the end of my two years as STEM Chairman. Here are some of my honest and heartfelt thoughts from July 1993 that still have the same meaning today as they did back then.

On August 1, 1991, I stepped into an adventure that would change my life forever. I became chairman of the TESA Staff Training for Effective Management (STEM) Committee. . . . I have learned many valuable lessons, one

of which is 'it's okay to enjoy your success, but you should never quite believe it.' The STEM program has grown like no one ever thought it would and has soared to heights that even I never imagined. It has done so because of the efforts of many dedicated people who came before me to begin this program and because of the dedication of so many educational support personnel who value the STEM program as part of their professional development. It is such a wonderful feeling to belong to an organization such as TESA whose members believe in their capabilities and know that STEM can aid them in achieving their goals. I was fortunate to have been given the opportunity to continue the program's success and the charge to keep it moving in the right direction."

Throughout the past 28 years, many people have served on the STEM Committee and as STEM Committee Chairmen and have been instrumental in the success of the STEM program. Each brought her own ideas, style, and creativity to the table but one thing has been consistently the same: each did what they felt was absolutely the best for the STEM program.

Thanks to the dedication of these committee members and chairmen and the thousands of current and past STEM participants, the TESA STEM program is still a valuable and important piece of professional development for educational support staff all across the State of Texas in public school districts as well as in colleges and universities. Twenty-eight years is a long time to keep a program of this magnitude going but I'm proud to say that we have. And I believe we will continue to do so because, in addition to all we have learned in our STEM classes, we have learned perseverance, determination, and pride. Keep up the GREAT work!! Long live STEM!!

#### Course Descriptions

#### **Required Courses**

Managing Change (6 hrs)

Change is all around us, and our ability to adapt,

manage, and facilitate change has an impact on both our professional and personal lives. Through this workshop participants learn skills that will help turn the challenges of change into possibilities for success.

Effective Office Practices (6 hrs)

Participants learn and review essential office techniques

including composition and mechanics of written

communications, grammar, office management, and the

development of a procedures manual.

Basic Communication (6 hrs)

An overview of communication including a survey of the

communication process of verbal and non-verbal skills

within the professional context.

Interpersonal Communication (6 hrs)

Participants are taught an awareness of the listening

process as well as identification and utilization of appropriate levels of response to the messages of

others.

Profile for Success (6 hrs)

Participants will complete a Personal Profile.

Communication styles are analyzed and skills are

developed for better communication.

Professional Growth Plan (3 hrs)

Participants discuss the goal-setting process and develop

personal plans of action for specific goals.

#### 3-hour courses

Assertiveness Training Establishes the difference between assertive and

aggressive behaviors. By discussion and role-play, participants are taught to use their abilities and self-image to protect their rights and the rights of others in a

positive manner.

Customer Service This class is about creating positive perceptions with

internal and external customers as well as improving

customer service techniques.



## STEM Courses

Dialogue of Diversity An examination of stereotypes and prejudices regarding

culture, ethnicity, and gender. Participants learn to appreciate the differences and deal effectively with all

individuals.

Leadership Training & Team Building This class is a discussion of leadership qualities, the

relationship between personality types and leadership styles, and communication and goal setting as they

relate to leadership.

Professional Image Creating and maintaining a professional image is

discussed. Workshop includes public relations, time management, attitude, communication, and dress.

Rules for Spelling/Proofreading Reviews basic spelling rules and correct word usage.

Teaches techniques of a successful proofreader.

Stress Management Reviews causes of stress in daily life and discusses

methods for adjusting attitudes and/or environment for

a less stressful life.

Telephone Skills Covers the evolution of the phone and how that affects

the manner in which we answer the phone. Discusses techniques to use with different types of callers and how to take accurate messages. Teaches good listening skills

and lists different approaches to handling a call.

Time Management Covers timesaving techniques and a guide to better

utilization of time.

6-hour courses

Business Grammar/Letter Writing This class is an in-depth review of business grammar

and techniques of business letter writing.

Assisting Difficult People Participants develop techniques for problem-solving and

communication skills for managing conflict.
