

## TESA 2012 Summer Work Conference in San Antonio



This was my first time to attend the TESA Summer Work Conference, and I found the conference to be very valuable to all support staff who work in the State of Texas. The conference theme last year supported San Jacinto College's focus on

Diversity. I attended eight sessions during this conference: "Effective Office Practices" (6 hour STEM session) by Barbara Jennings, "Records Retention - What Every School Employee Should Know" and "Managing Activity Accounts: 10 Things You Should Know" both by Becky Estrada, the "General Session" meeting where the keynote speaker Allie Fave Matthews spoke on diversity, "True Success", "Call the Fashion Police 911" by Dianne Lemons and "Cardio Line Dancing" by Cindy Freeland. Finally the "Catch the Wave Good-bye Brunch" where the keynote speaker again reinforced diversity in the workplace, how things are perceived and interpreted based on life experiences, and how we all need to adapt to change if we want to achieve our workplace goals.

The Diversity presentation and the keynote address at the general session were presented by Allie Faye Matthews, 2011-2012 NAEOP President. Her definition of diversity was: inclusion of things, places, people, etc.; equality for all people; accept people for the content of their character. She led an exercise where she had us divide into groups of two people (who knew one another), then she had us write down four things to describe the other person without using skin color, hair color, eye color, or what they were wearing in the descriptions. Next she had us share what was written with the other person and ask if the descriptions were valid or not. This exercise was to point out that once you remove the outside appearances, one has to focus on the character of the individual to make a conclusion about the person. She also made mention of a speech on diversity by Carol Moseley Braun, a short story called "Work of Our Souls" by Joseph Mezella, and referenced the diverse social status in the movie "Titanic."

I especially enjoyed Becky Estrada's presentation on records retention and activity codes. She works for Lackland ISD, and I was very impressed with her school forms on the internet. Becky shared knowledge based on the State of Texas record retention laws and about reconciling receipts. She discussed profit and

loss forms, how emails become a part of public record, and what state auditors are looking for when they come to see your receipts. I would love her to come do a professional development workshop for San Jacinto College. She was an excellent presenter who taught state law in a way anyone could understand.

Benefits to San Jacinto College Staff:

- Diversity education helps us all to better understand colleagues and students. It helps us take our focus off our differences and focus on our goals, which is working as a team to achieve departmental success and assist students in reaching their educational goals.
- The records retention and activity account sessions gave me resources I can implement in our department so that we can track purchases better and store records efficiently, and it also gave me a better understanding of Texas state law.
- The Effective Office Practices STEM session gave me ideas to implement within our department, such as creating a manual in case a temporary worker or substitute ever had to do my job, organizing files, increasing vocabulary by learning new words daily, and organizing 12 things a day at your desk to remove clutter.

## Are you glad the election is over?



Whether your candidate won or lost, we all enjoy the freedom to vote. I hope each of you participated in the November 6, 2012 election process. I am glad to put all of the electioneering behind us and now look forward to what's ahead. We all are

concerned about the United States economy and the "fiscal cliff" that the current legislative session created. What will the Executive and Legislative branches do to pull us back from the brink of economic uncertainty? Those of us that deal with school finances have seen the steps the Texas Education Agency has taken regarding the sequestration of Federal funds. All of

our grants have been cut. We are all hoping this will be reversed and Federal funds restored.

However, we must also concern ourselves with the upcoming Texas 83rd Legislative session, which will convene Tuesday, January 8, 2013. They will meet for 140 days, ending the session May 27, 2013. Our prayer will be that they make the very best decisions for Texas and especially, for Texas education. If you followed the election results, the Texas Senate maintained their partisan balance; however, the Texas house added a handful of Democrats. This means that the Republicans no longer hold a super majority and that House rules cannot be suspended, to fast track legislation, as in the last session. It also means that some Democrats will have to be present in order to have a quorum. It will be a very interesting session.

The 83rd Legislature will have to deal with basically

the same issues that arose in the previous session: Spending, immigration, abortion, education, Medicaid, etc. Medicaid may have to be the first order of business. Funding will run out by March 2013, without this program many poor, elderly, and disabled will not be served. All school districts have Medicaid eligible students and many districts rely on Medicaid funds generated by serving qualified students to supplement Special Education programs.

Education - As you know, more than 600 school districts have sued the Legislature over public school funding. It is believed that the school districts will prevail, but the decision will surely result in an appeal. The appeal process may take years to resolve. In the end, it will be up to the legislature to resolve this complex issue. It is too early to get a feel for the direction the 83rd Legislature will take regarding funding for the next biennium.

# Growing Up with MEPA By Jennifer Lamb, Mesquite ISD



Believe it or not...I was once a shy quiet person and this person still lives deep down inside of me. Man, have I changed these past several years. Working with the district as a paraprofessional has helped me grow

into the leader I am today.

I was seventeen years old when I graduated from Mesquite High School in the spring of 1998. I decided to start my grown-up journey by enrolling at our local Junior College, Eastfield, for the fall semester. I had completed my first year as a college student and decided it was time to find a job since summer was around the corner. I was now eighteen years old with no idea what I wanted to do. Lucky for me, I just happened to know a wonderful woman in my church who worked for the school district that could help get my foot in the door. In June of 1999, I was interviewed for a secretary assistant position for the Mesquite High School Counseling/Registrar's Office. I started immediately.

Being new to the work world without any experience, I was scared to death. There was a lot to learn. I had never had a job before, and this was it...time to grow up and make some money. I even remember my very first paycheck; oh the excitement! I showed up to my first job as the part-time Student Registrar Secretary Assistant to Dianne Lemons. I was introduced to the basics: making copies, filing and pulling student transcripts, computer data entry, typing up TEA forms for student driver licensees, sorting mail, withdrawing students, answering the phone, etc... I remember the first time I flew solo on a phone call. Dianne had to teach me how to do the simple task of answering a telephone! I had watched and observed what to do, but when it came time

for me to answer my first call, I panicked. As the phone rang, I looked at Dianne and asked, "What do I say?" She looked at me with confidence and told me to say, "Mesquite High School. This is Jennifer. How may I help you?" I was so nervous that I nearly dropped the phone as I took it off the receiver. I said what Dianne had told me to say; "Mesquite High School, this is Dianne. I mean, this is Jennifer." I was so embarrassed and certain that if I had just stuck with the name, "Dianne" the caller probably would have never noticed that it wasn't really Dianne and it could have saved me the embarrassment. I survived my first day of training. I worked at Mesquite High School for 2 years while attending junior college but it was time to graduate and move on. I graduated with my Associate's in the spring and continued to work as long as I could before leaving for college, again. As nervous as ever, I went back again and again, learning something new every day. What I learned stayed with me for the next several years of my Mesquite ISD career experience.

In August of 2001, I left the district to pursue my Bachelor's Degree with Dallas Baptist University. Again, I survived college and graduated in May 2004 with a BA in Art: Drawing and Painting. I can't count the number of majors I started and stopped because I couldn't find what I was happy doing. I found that Art helped me express myself in a quiet way by putting my feelings on canvas and giant sheets of sketch paper, but I still didn't know what I wanted to be when I grew up. I was an adult this time at the age of twenty-three and a job was the first thing to find, again. I attempted to go the teaching route, but being the shy and insecure person that I am, I was still scared. I have a "small" fear of speaking in front of large groups and I knew I couldn't stand in front of that many people and talk, let alone expect them to listen to me, so, I avoided that route.

After graduation, I decided to pursue a position with Mesquite ISD, again. It seemed to be harmless the first time. August came along and I received a call from one of the elementary campus principals, Ed Burns, who had heard my name through the grapevine, and he scheduled an interview with me. The job was to be a classroom assistant to the Resource teacher, Sarah Crowl, at Cannaday. During my interview with him, he led me to the classroom for Sarah to meet me and give me a brief interview herself and let me observe the class. He said in the end, the choice was really hers because she had to work with me. Sarah apparently felt something was right about our meeting and she gave Ed a thumbs-up behind my back as we exited the room. She did not tell me about her thumbs-up until she left teaching to become a stay-at-home mom 2 years later. With her thumbs-up signal, Ed hired me on the spot. As a classroom assistant, I was forced to come out of my shell. On a daily basis, I worked with the children one on one where I had to play the responsible role and keep control of the classroom when the teacher was out of the room. Talk about nerves and panic again. A classroom full of kids...I already told myself I can't be in a classroom telling people what to do. It worked out well though. I gained the respect of the students because I gave them respect, and as I worked with the students I learned how to control my bashfulness.

Since I was back in the district working at Cannaday, I got recruited, by Dianne, to serve on the Hospitality Committee with the Mesquite Educational Paraprofessional Association. This really helped me continue to grow out of my shell. I had to attend all the MEPA meetings and greet people, serve snacks, clean up after them and ultimately work alongside the MEPA Board and attend meetings where I was encouraged to speak out and step up. I served two years on the Hospitality Committee. I was also asked to serve as Liaison Booster during my second term as Hospitality chair. I was the behind-the-scene goody-bag bandit. I got to send each liaison a gift once a month without having to be recognized. Loved it! I didn't have to speak or stand in front of people. Each year, I was asked to serve again, in a new position. I moved on

to be MEPA Secretary, and again, I didn't have to be in front of people. I just had to sit at the meetings, quietly, and take minutes. It was the perfect position for my introverted personality. My third year at Cannaday, I was asked to serve as First Vice President - Programs. Now, I was responsible for planning and scheduling all the MEPA meetings... still in the background. I never had to speak in front of anyone. It was the perfect position, again. It was also the year I attended my first TESA Fall Work Conference where I became known as "giggles" to all my new TESA friends. For the record, I was hiding a lot of nerves behind those giggles, and I still am.

Three years passed at Cannaday and I moved on to North Mesquite High School where I worked as an Attendance Secretary for the Junior Class. I had a lot more interaction with people, mostly students and teachers. I was constantly on the computer teaching myself new software and programs and still very busy with MEPA. Growing continued and by this time, everyone one knew me as giggles or the "Woo-Who!" girl from MEPA and TESA. The more meetings I attended, the louder I became. During this time, I served more time with MEPA. I became the Secretary, again, which, remember, I loved because I didn't have to speak in front of anyone. The following year, I took on Historian, still in the background taking pictures. Telling myself, "I definitely don't have to speak in front of people with a camera on me all the time." I loved Historian. It had the least amount of speaking of any position. I was very comfortable there.

Two years and six weeks passed for me at North Mesquite and I have once again moved on with the district. I am now working as Administrative Assistant to the Director of Technical Services, where I am in contact with a variety of personnel across the district. I had to get over my nervousness in order to call contractors and service providers. I have consultants that I am in contact with from Oklahoma and as far away as Chicago. I am reaching out nation-wide at this point. Woo who! There is no time to be timid and insecure.

Then it came that time of year for a new board to be selected. Another board member, also a good

friend of mine, was desperate for a President-elect and all of her options had sadly declined her offer to serve alongside her as she was about to serve as our President. I even declined her offer a couple times because I felt I was not ready. I like sitting in the background. I can't stand in front of large groups and speak. Remember, I ruled out the option of being a teacher for the same reason! I do not do large group speeches and gatherings! Or so I thought. In November of 2010, while attending the TESA Fall Work Conference in San Marcos, Sandy Salazar was writing out her list of possible nominations for officers for our upcoming ballot and she looked worried because only one position remained empty. It was President-Elect. As I watched her discuss the issue with Paula Lambright, I couldn't take it anymore. Something was tugging on my heart and I took it as God pushing me. ## Save a Tree – Save Your District Dollars!

Are you inundated with catalogs for folks no longer in your department/on your campus? Do you spend countless hours each month sifting through mail and tossing away/redirecting unwanted/ unneeded mail? Do you have any idea what this repetitive action costs your district?

If you're like me, and have been around a while, you've seen teachers come and go, district officials change positions and eventually retire, and yet their mail continues to arrive on schedule, as if expecting the person to materialize any minute. Sound familiar?

So take a few minutes, drop a quick note to the publisher, save a tree, and save your district much-needed dollars! What would that look like, you ask???

A quick two or three line letter to the catalog's originator is all you need to stop the daily unnecessary mail flooding your desk. I started this when I was a campus secretary (just after the pony express was replaced!). Our teachers moved around, changed positions, retired – and I still received mail for them.

Now, I take tampering with the mail as a VERY serious offense! So, I couldn't just give it to the next teacher, as was suggested,

unless the address label told me to do just that. To save a tree (and my time, the mail carrier's time, etc.), I composed a two line letter, personally addressed a copy to each company, included the mailing label from each catalog (often they are given a code number as reference), and sent them back, providing the replacement teacher's name, if we had one.

What I found was half the mail arriving every day! Half my mail sorting time returned to something more productive. And, can you imagine our district mail carriers' time?

I continue this practice today. As Administrative Assistant to one of the Associate Superintendents, I explain in my "form" letter that my boss isn't the contact person for catalogs. I go a step farther and provide the appropriate person's name and title to whom future catalogs should be sent. And, of course, that all important mailing label!

Yes, it takes my time, but it saves in the long-run. It save the company's mail budget, saves the Post Office time, saves the district mail-carrier's time, saves my future time, saves the custodian's time in recycling all that pretty paper, saves the district money, and saves at least a tree or two! So, I've done my part for smart tax-payer money

management and the environment.

And, lest you think I do this every day, let me set your mind at rest. This is a project I often "hold" on my crazy-busy days, and do at the end of one week day. I process a few letters/catalogs between 4:00-4:30, drop the letters on my way out, and have been productive those last few minutes when my brain is about mush anyway!

Does this make sense? Will it help save time and money in the future? Can you imagine if every campus/administrative department in every district did this?

Let's do our part for smart fiscal management and the forest! Join me in my quest to reduce the unwanted mail coming through our system daily.

Compose that form letter – holler if I can help!

At the October 24, 2012 meeting we celebrated Breast Cancer Awareness month with a presentation from Ms. Dana Duckworth, RN. Staying at a healthy weight, being physically active, and limiting how much alcohol you drink can help reduce your risk of breast cancer. Regular screening can often find breast cancer early when treatments are more likely to be successful. Nurse Duckworth also provided valuable information about cancer screening, pre-

vention, early detection and other helpful resources.

The agenda for our November 28, 2012 meeting focused on professional training to strengthen our commitment to put an end to bullying in our schools. Aguirre Junior High At-Risk Facilitator, Doris Graves, provided an in-depth look at the aspects, consequences and preventative measures our District is taking in the stand against bullying. Research indicates that most victims of bullying in schools are too meek to take matters into their own hands. However, in recent years we have witnessed tragedies as victims reached critical limits. A study showed that 60% of identified bullies dur-

ing their grade 6-9 years eventually got involved in at least one criminal conviction by age 24. Clearly it is a problem that builds to later consequences and if each school district strives to be vigilant enough to detect the presence of the problem and strong in their resolve to discipline the perpetrators, bullying prevention can come into fruition.

Plans are well underway for 2013 as the CESA Officers work together to bring more opportunities to plant seeds and continue to grow in our personal and professional strengths.
